Fran Lockie

Dr Fran Lockie MBBS, BSc (hons), MRCPCH, FRACP Senior consultant in Paediatric Emergency Medicine (PEM), Women's and Children's Hospital (WCH), Adelaide Consultant and Acting Head of Unit MedSTAR Kids, Pre-Hospital and Retrieval Medicine, MedSTAR Emergency Medical Retrieval Service.

Dr Francis Lockie is a paediatric emergency specialist and retrieval physician. Early experiences at the Trauma Unit at Cook County Hospital, Chicago and at St Mary's Hospital during the 2005 London bombings reinforced his interest in acute care paediatrics. He trained in London before moving to Sydney to work for NSW paediatric and neonatal transport service (NETS) and complete his training in paediatric emergency medicine. He worked on the faculty at Sydney Children's and British Columbia (BC) Children's Hospitals

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before moving to Adelaide to take up a combined position in PEM and paediatric & neonatal retrieval. He is interested in emergency airway management and currently chairs the WCH airway safety group. He is an active APLS instructor and enjoys teaching on the annual instructor course in Sri Lanka. Fran deployed to Samoa for the measles crisis with the Australian Medical Assistance Team (AUSMAT) and also runs the safety and quality programme for PED. He lectures nationally and internationally on paediatric emergencies and retrieval. Fran lives in Adelaide with his wife and three children.
